#### Catholic Parish News

Eight of our parishioners were among other pilgrims from our diocese, coming to Walsingham, Norfolk, as "Pilgrims of Hope" in this Jubilee Year 2025.



The shrine of Our Lady of Walsingham was originally established in 1061 by Richeldis de Faverches who had it built, in response to Our Lady, to replicate the house in Nazareth where the angel Gabriel appeared to her. It

became one of the greatest shrines in Medieval Christendom. The site of the original "Holy House" is now in the Abbey grounds in the village. The shrine was demolished at The Reformation and it wasn't until 1897, after Catholic Emancipation, when the 14<sup>th</sup> century Slipper Chapel, where

pilgrims would take their shoes off to walk the last mile to the "Holy House" was rediscovered. In 1934 the Slipper Chapel was declared the National Shrine of Our Lady for Catholics in England.

Our time there was blessed with hospitality, good company, beautiful liturgy and uplifting teaching. It is worth noting, too, that there is a beautiful Anglican shrine in the village within which is a replica of the "Holy House".

#### Leatherhead Youth Project

Over the summer term, Leatherhead Youth Project (LYP) has carried on

running a youth café in Bookham after school on Mondays and Fridays. We have particularly been enjoying the warmer weather and using the outdoor space around the Pastoral Centre.

Over the Easter holidays, LYP ran our annual residential trip, Freestyle. We took 24 young people to Walton Firs for three days of fun where they were able to do lots of different outdoor activities and take part in some





workshops which looked at building resilience and coping with difficult situations. The weather was beautiful, and the young people had a great time!

During half term, we ran our social action project, Making Good. We took some young people from Bookham and Leatherhead to Elysian Farm where they did some weeding in the fields, fed the animals and build some raised beds for growing vegetables. As a reward, we took them on a climbing trip!

We have been working with the Howard of Effingham school to provide support for their students and have been running some group work where we assist young people in improving their emotional wellbeing. We are continuing to run lunchtime clubs and offer one-to-one support for young people who would like it.

This term, we have been looking at healthy relationships during our Monday evening sessions, having conversations about different kinds of relationships and what makes them



healthy or unhealthy. We have looked at relationships with friends, families, partners, adults, and those formed online. *Continued over*
