# **Letter from the Ministry Team**

The memorial service to remember the life of Charlie Kirk, who was killed by a single bullet while speaking in front of 3000 students at Utah Valley University, included not a few surprises.

For me feasibly, the greatest surprise were the words of Charlie's wife, Erika: "I forgive him [22-year-old suspect Tyler Robinson] because it was what Christ did, and it is what Charlie would do."

Of course she's right. Christ did indeed do that ... on the cross. Moreover, this mindset was central to his teaching: "But I tell you, love your enemies and pray for those who persecute you..." (Matthew 5:44).

Ericka's words were, then, highly commendable and, indeed, very Christlike.

And yet I couldn't help wondering, had I had been in her situation, would I have been quite so ready to say what she said? After all, the memorial service took place just days after her husband's most brutal death. I suspect that I would have been much nearer to those psalmists who on occasions didn't hold back: "In your unfailing love, silence my enemies; destroy all my foes, for I am your servant." (Psalm 143:12)

In the end, though, who am I to judge? If Erika Kirk felt this was something she truly wanted to say and could say with honesty, then I

rejoice, particularly when so many from around the world would have noted what she said and, I trust, been challenged by the power of her words.

As we head towards another Remembrance Sunday and Day, the issue of forgiving those who do us harm is never far from the surface. Yes, war is sometimes a necessary evil, particularly when not standing up to an aggressor risks greater harm. And yet when war is over, the essential business of forgiveness must begin if past rivalries are not to rear their ugly head again.

Speaking the day after Charlie Kirk's memorial service, David Walker, Bishop of Manchester, rightly commented, "We'll never defeat hate with more hate; we can only defeat hate with love. And what she [Erika Kirk] showed was love, because forgiveness has to spring from love."

So once again this Remembrance season we'll give thanks for all those who have given sacrificially in the cause of war. But may we at the same time take the opportunity to examine our hearts to ensure we are not holding on to past anger and resentments which keep us from true Christlikeness.

# Report from the PCC Meeting 8th September 2025

Alan opened the meeting with a reading from Acts 15 where there is an issue of whether Gentile Christians should also follow Jewish customs and be circumcised. The passage is an example of how Peter and the church leaders deal with the problem and reach an acceptable compromise.

**Finance -** The draft 2026 budget will be presented to the November PCC and the final budget will be on the agenda for approval at the January meeting.

The Draft Finance Policy and Procedures and Reserve Requirement were presented and approved. The aim of these documents is to document the approach to ensure, and to demonstrate, that we have taken necessary steps to steward and protect funds.

The Treasurer outlined a proposal to reduce the amount held in reserves to £100,000 which would free up resources for the church.

**Utilities** – following extensive research, a deal has been done to buy green gas from Positive Energy and green electricity from Smarter Energy.

**Overall State of Finances -** income from planned giving is still significantly below budget.

Review of Mission Organisations 2026 - Gill Caldwell reported back from the Outward Giving Review Team. PCC approved the proposal that for 2026-2029, we will continue to support The Bible Society, Christian Solidarity Worldwide (CSW), and Christians Against Poverty (CAP) and we will begin support for the A Rocha eco charity, The Meeting Place (Anna Chaplaincy) and Hope for Harare (a special needs school in Zimbabwe). The PCC requested that the safest, most efficient way be found to send donations to Hope for Harare. It was also made clear the support for The Meeting Place does not include the Community Fridge (which self-funds).

**New Assistant Warden** – Romey Criswick has kindly agreed to take on this role and was duly appointed to PCC and to the role.

**Living in Love and Faith (LLF)** – In February 2026, the General Synod **may make some further** decisions on general practice regarding the approach of the Church of England to same sex relationships. Alan updated PCC on the current position and suggested PCC members may like to ensure they are up to speed concerning this issue as PCCs may need to make their own decisions at that time.

**Fabric** - David Barnes reported an overspend of just £50 on the cost of the toilet refurbishment (£28,750 ex VAT). Other savings meant extra

work such as painting the lobby area could be undertaken. The next project is to build storage cupboards in the Church Room.

Our **Safeguarding Officer**, Roland Martin, is working to ensure all team leaders have up to date Safeguarding training. Safeguarding Sunday on 16<sup>th</sup> November will be marked in our services.

The **inductive loop** used by people with hearing impairment is unfortunately still not working. A quote to repair or replace it urgently is in hand.

**Health and Safety Update** – an inspection of the churchyard found a number of unstable headstones. Some have been laid down, for others, the descendants are being contacted and asked to take action.

## Should Young People Adhere To a Revised Moral Code?

I recently read disturbing news regarding the attitudes of some young people: -

"Twenty five percent of new teachers leave the profession within three years of qualifying, primarily as a result of antisocial behaviour within the primary and secondary sector and a lack of respect for parents and teachers".

One answer I heard of to remedy the problem was to ensure that young people are taught the elements of a revised Moral Code!

Many parents perhaps defaulted on their child's education, as both are working creating a degree of absenteeism but this may be unfair? It has been reported in the press that very young children are coming to school unable to dress themselves or go to the toilet as they are not potty trained, this is where perhaps training as a parent might be useful?

However, is a revised Moral Code really necessary? If so, who would present it? Parents, teachers, religious denominations, the Education Secretary?

A combination of parents, teachers, religious leaders is essential working to reconfirm and strengthen an existing moral framework. Respect for and caring for fellow pupils, family members, teachers, and exercising good manners. Values of honesty and integrity needs be promoted.

There should be a morning assembly, regardless of the school's denomination, a prayer or moral reflection is essential for all young people, as was provided for by the 1944 Education act.

### **Friends of St Nicolas**

We are incredibly fortunate in Great Bookham — or at least we think so — to have the iconic St Nicolas Church standing right in the heart of our village. For many, it's more than just a church building; it's part of what makes our village so special.

Whether you're walking past, sitting and listening to the church bells, or perhaps attending a community event, St Nicolas is a constant and reassuring presence in our daily lives.

What many people do not realise though, is that maintaining this beautiful Grade I listed building is a considerable and ongoing financial challenge. There is no funding from central church sources for the upkeep of the building itself. The full burden falls on the local congregation. Naturally, their first priority is supporting the spiritual and community work of the church — which leaves very little room in the budget for major repairs and restoration projects.

That is why the Friends of St Nicolas was created, to give everyone in the village — especially those who might not attend church services — a way to contribute to the preservation of this historic building. It is for those who care for the presence of the church in Great Bookham, even if they do not worship there. The group offers a practical and meaningful way to help ensure the church remains standing, welcoming, and beautiful for future generations.

The need for support is real. When the tower needed urgent stabilisation in 2000, it was the Friends who helped fund the work. Since then, the group has supported numerous repairs and maintenance projects, large and small. Without their help, many of these tasks simply would not have been possible.

Right now, the Friends are supporting important work to preserve the structure of the Lychgate. Expert stonemasons will soon begin replacing several badly eroded stone blocks, which are vital to keeping the hinges secure. Looking ahead, we also hope to raise enough funds to clean some of the stained-glass windows — a job that has not been done in decades and would make a noticeable difference to the light, beauty and atmosphere inside the church.

If you've ever paused to admire the church as you walked through the village, or felt a quiet pride in having such a historic place at the centre of our community where you can sit in quiet contemplation, or walk through the churchyard, please consider joining the Friends of St Nicolas.

#### A CONTINUING STORY



For the past few years Mission Aviation Fellowship has been one of the charities which we at St Nicolas have supported. Although MAF is no longer one of our selected Charities, its work goes on, and it is an amazing story. Below is an extract from the current Prayer Diary which reminds us about some of what MAF has done in the past 80 years.

'As we come to the end of MAF's 80<sup>th</sup> anniversary year, we're incredibly thankful for all that God has done. We could never have dreamed that God would grow MAF as He has. We now have more than 115 aircraft flying to some 1,000 remote destinations – enabling the life transforming work of about 1,500 aid, development and mission organisations.

Whether we're flying essential personnel and vital cargo to isolated regions, or transporting those in need of urgent medical help, we overcome challenging terrain, distance, conflict and economic barriers to assist the people who need it most.

MAF has been there for isolated people since 1945 and will continue to help them for decades to come. We do so because no man, woman or child should suffer due to a lack of access. We will never know all the ways that prayer has saved and changed lives. But although we don't always see the answers t our prayers, we continue to lift our voices to the Lord.'

MAF was started by two men, Stuart King and Jack Hawkins, who wanted to use their flying skills, honed in the second world war, to positive ends instead of destruction, and that is how the Charity was born. No flight leaves the ground without the pilot committing it to the Lord in prayer, and by prayer great things have been and continue to be achieved. What a great tree has grown from the determination and commitment of two prayerful men.

# All Saints' Day - The meaning and History behind November 1st

All Saints' Day, also known as All Hallows' Day, is a Christian holiday that is observed on November 1<sup>st</sup> in Western Christianity. It is a Christian memorial day celebrating the honour of all church saints, whether known or unknown. It is a day set aside to honour all the saints who have lived righteous and holy lives in accordance with Christian teachings. All Saints' Day is part of a broader tradition that includes All Hallows' Eve (Halloween) on October 31<sup>st</sup> and All Souls' Day on November 2<sup>nd</sup>. The holiday is a yearly reminder of our connectedness as Christians to the church. Who is a saint? You are. That is if you are a follower of Jesus. God calls a "saint" those who trust in Christ alone for salvation.

"And he who searches hearts knows what is the mind of the Spirit, because the Spirit intercedes for the **saints** according to the will of God" (Romans 8:27).

Here is a call for the endurance of the **saints**, those who keep the commandments of God and their faith in Jesus. (Revelation 14:12)

The origin of All Saints' Day can be traced back to the early Christian Church when it was established as a day to remember and celebrate the martyrs and other saints who had died for their faith. Over time, the scope of the holiday expanded to include Christians who had lived pious and virtuous lives. It is a day to recognise the saints' collective witness and express gratitude for their example.

In the early Christian Church, there was a strong emphasis on the veneration of martyrs who had suffered and died for their faith. These martyrs were seen as exemplary models of Christian virtue, and their graves or burial places became sites of pilgrimage and veneration. The anniversary of a martyr's death often became a day for commemorating their lives and the sacrifices they made for their faith.

Over time, the holiday's focus expanded beyond just martyrs to include all Christian saints – those who were recognised for their exceptional holiness and devotion to God. The shift recognised that not all saints were martyrs, so a broader commemoration was needed.

In the Western Christian Church, Pope Gregory III (731-741) is often credited with establishing November 1<sup>st</sup> as the date for All Saints' Day. This date was chosen to coincide with the dedication of a chapel in St Peter's Basilica in Rome to "All the Saints". It was an attempt to unify the various the various local celebrations of saints' feast days and set a universal date for honouring the saints.

The Christian festival of All Saints' Day comes from a conviction that there is a globe vary for All Saints' Day, the common theme is celebration with family and remembrance of those who have passed.

#### Who are the Saints?

Sainthood isn't limited to those recognised by a group of religious leaders. It is granted by God Himself to any common, salt-of the-earth person who simply trusts Christ (1Corinthians 1:2). Words matter and sowing confusion about good, biblical words like "saint" is not from God.

"To the church of God that is in Corinth, to those sanctified in Christ Jesus, called to be saints together with all those who in every place call upon the name of our Lord Jesus Christ, both their Lord and ours" (1Cor. 1:2).

The gospel message is that God the Son came to earth, lived a life of perfectly obedient life, died on the cross to pay for our sins (Romans 5:1), and rose again, proving His atoning work was complete (Romans 4:22-25). Scripture says that the person of faith actually becomes the righteousness of God (2Cor. 5:21).

Through a living faith (the means of salvation), we become united to Christ (the source of salvation), and we are saved from God's judgement as well as the futile way of life that naturally follow (1Peter 3:18). In other words, we are granted sainthood! Think about this: if God calls the worldly, sinning believers in Corinth "saints" — and He does in 1Corinthians 1:2 — couldn't He also call you a saint? Anyone who trusts in Christ alone for salvation is a saint in God's sight.

### History of All Saints' Day

In the early years when the Roman Empire persecuted Christians, so many martyrs died for their faith that the church set aside days to honour them e.g. in 607 Emperor Phocas presented the beautiful Roman Pantheon temple to the pope. The pope removed the statue of Jupiter and the pagan gods and consecrated the Pantheon to "all saints" who had died from Roman persecution in the first 300 years after Christ. Many bones were brought from other graves and placed in the rededicated Pantheon church. Since there were too many martyrs for each day to be given a day, they were lumped together into one day. In the next century, All Saints Day was changed by Pope Gregory III to today's date- November 1<sup>st</sup>. People prepared for their celebration with a night of vigil on Hallows' Eve – Halloween (possibly because of the strong holdover influence of the Celtic Samhain festival which many Christians had continued to observe).

In the 10<sup>th</sup> century, Abbot Odela of the Cluny monastery added the next day – November 2nd – as All Souls' Day to honour the martyrs and all Christians who had died. People prayed for the dead, but many unchristian superstitions continued. People in Christian lands offered food to the dead – as it had been in pagan times. The superstitious also believed that on these two days, souls in purgatory would take the form of witches, toads, or demons and haunt persons who had wronged them during their lifetime. As happens so often in Church history, sacred Christian festivals can absorb so many pagan customs that they lose their significance as Christian holidays Why not use All Saints' day to think and give thanks for as many Christians from the past as you can remember, whether they are famous or not, especially if their lives and teachings contributed something to yours?

## How to celebrate All Saints' Day

The 1662 Book of Common Prayer says the holiday stands for "the unity of Christians of all ages, countries, and races in Christ, and the perfection of that unity in heaven". It dates the holiday back to about A.D. 610 when the pantheon in Rome turned into a Christian Church, was dedicated to all saints. The bible doesn't tell us to pray to the saints (Matt. 6:6) or *through* the saints (1Tim 2:5). Instead, we think of our connectedness to past saints and find

inspiration in their stories of God's faithfulness. Hebrews 11 gives many examples of the great cloud of witnesses whose lives tell of God's unfailing love and grace. These saints speak from the past and are whispering at this moment...

There is a hymn that is traditionally sung around this holiday called "For all the Saints". It encourages believers to look back through the years of Christian history and think of the millions now enjoying rest and salvation in the presence of God. It is also meant to encourage believers to press on, looking forward to the glorious day.


